Note on speakers:

- Dr James Murray studied history at NUI Galway, and holds a PhD from Trinity College,
 Dublin. He has published a number of important articles on the religious history and
 historiography of sixteenth-century Ireland, and has recently published a major work,
 Enforcing the English Reformation in Ireland (Cambridge University Press, 2009), which will be
 standard for many years to come. Jim is currently the Chief Executive of the National
 Qualifications Authority in Ireland.
- **Dr Michael O'Neill** studied Economics and Philosophy (BA) and Architectural History (PhD) at Trinity. He has published a number of important articles, particularly in relation to Irish cathedrals. He is currently completing a study of post-medieval churches in the diocese of Meath, while cataloguing the antiquarian drawings of George Victor du Noyer held in the RSAI.
- **Professor Tony Fahey** is Professor of Social Policy in the School of Applied Social Science, University College Dublin. He is a co-editor of *Consensus and conflict. A study of values and attitudes in the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland* (2005), and more recently contributed a chapter on the subject of Protestant integration in Ireland in Busteed, Neal and Tonge (eds), *Irish Protestant identities* (2008).
- Ms Evie Monaghan is a graduate of NUI Galway, currently in her second year of an integrated M.Litt/PhD program at NUI Maynooth under the supervision of Prof. Raymond Gillespie. She is undertaking a comparative analysis of Eucharistic practice and belief in relation to three denominations in Ireland between 1660 and 1740.
